## **B.A.** (Programme)

The restructured course of B.A. (Programme) enables students to attain a solid grounding in specific disciplines, acquire linguistic skills and equips them with skills to enter the world of work.

## **Options for B.A. (Programme)**

#### 1. A.S.P.S.M. – Advertising, Sales Promotion and Sales Management

This course addresses the management challenge of designing and implementing the best combination of marketing actions to carry out a firm's strategy in its target markets. Specifically, this course seeks to develop the students' skills in applying the analytic perspectives, decision tools, and concepts of marketing.

#### 2. Economics

The department of Economics endeavours to impart specialized knowledge to create a class of skilled professional and intellectual individuals who can cope with the socio- economic and politico- economic challenges in the current global village. The department aims to acquaint students with problems of economies and affects insights into processes of markets and sustenance etc. The dedicated and sincere faculty aspires to enhance the capability and capacity of students.

The curriculum of the courses offered is designed to teach, train and prepare them for acquisition of scientific acumen. Presently the department offers following courses -

The above- mentioned Generic Elective courses -- for Honours students other than Economics and Skill Enhancement Courses -- for B. A. (Programme) students are career- oriented and empowering.

#### 3. English

The Department of English has been functional ever since the inception of the college in 1994. The faculty is well qualified with over 95% members having completed their Ph.D. The team also makes special efforts to update its knowledge bank through regular participation in Seminars and workshops. Two faculty members are ELT trained and have been successfully conducting the English Language Proficiency Course, a Certificate Course initiated by the University of Delhi.

English is compulsory for B.A./B.Com. (Programme) students and is taught in alternate semesters namely, I&III or II&IV. Those who have studied English up to class XII are offered stream A whereas those who have done English up to class X are given stream B. Students who have studied English up to class VIII may pursue stream C only. A.E.C.C.(Business Communication, English) is offered across all courses. For Generic English, the following options may be taken in semester I, II, III and IV respectively,

- 1.Academic Writing and Composition
- 2.Language ,Literature and Culture
- 3. Contemporary India: Women and Empowerment
- 4. Readings on Indian Diversities and Literary Movements

#### 4. Food Technology (F.T.)

Food Technology is a discipline course of Home Science. This course aims at enriching the minds of those students who have interest in learning the techniques of baking as well as fruit and vegetable preservation in the broader context of food science and food safety. It aims to develop a holistic and multidimensional understanding of the topics. It attempts to approach new areas of learning, develop competencies in the students for food science and technology thereby opening various avenues for skill development, academic understanding,

entrepreneurship and employment in food industry. The content of the course has been drawn-up to accommodate the widening horizons of food processing industry and reflects the current changing needs of the food industry comprising of Food Product Development, Food Safety, Bakery Technology, Entrepreneurship and Food Quality Management. The objectives of the course are-

- To introduce the students to the fundamentals of food science and technology,
- To familiarize them with processing and preservation techniques of cereals, pulses, fruits and vegetables, egg and milk and its products,
- To impart knowledge about the science and techniques of baking as well as fruit and vegetable preservation,
- To emphasize on the importance of food safety, food quality, food laws and regulations, plant sanitation, packaging, marketing and cost control in food industry.

#### 5. Geography

The Department of Geography began in 1994 with the inclusion of the subject paper in B.A. (Programme). While studying Geography as a Discipline, students will have a sound understanding of basic theory in Geography and of emerging concerns, which have a spatial bearing at the global and national level. This would prepare them to pursue advanced courses in Geography and related disciplines, or branch off to other related fields.

Human Development and Family Empowerment is a paper offered in B.A.(Programme) CBCS under the discipline Home Science. The papers in H.D.F.E. emphasize development programmes, legislations for women and children. It has excellent combination of skill-based and generic courses for students of other disciplines to make them competent in dealing with issues related to women, children, elderly, 'divyang' etc. Following is the scheme of papers in H.D.F.E.:

#### 7. History

History is a never ending dialogue between past and present. It studies the past which has relevance today in all walks of life – social, cultural, political, economic and environmental etc. It gives opportunity to study various dimensions of the civilization across the globe.

#### 8. Mathematics

B.A. (Programme) with Mathematics has the following structure:

- Four core courses
- Four skill enhancement courses and
- two discipline specific elective

In skill enhancement course LaTex, H.T.M.L., Computer algebra systems and Software, Operating System: Linux, Transportation and Game Theory will be taught. After completing B.A., mathematics students can pursue courses like M.A., M.C.A. and B.Ed. They can also explore the areas like actuarial sciences, banking and civil services etc. Moreover, Mathematics is an integral part of various competitions and job-seeking examinations. Preference will be given to students who have studied Mathematics up to class 12<sup>th</sup>.

#### 9. Music

The department of music offers the students a platform and outlet to their talent and creativity. It is a comprehensive training course which brings the students closer to the rich Indian traditions and cultural heritage.

#### 10. Nutrition and Health Education (N.H.E.)

Nutrition and Health Education is a discipline course of Home Science. This course aims to develop a holistic and multidimensional understanding of the various topics. The syllabus covers basic aspects of nutrients, food science, and nutrition concerns in various stages of life cycle, food safety, and food security as well as open a vast understanding of the current spectrum of malnutrition. This course equips the students for skill development, academic understanding, entrepreneurship, community role and employment in various fields of food industry, health clinics and N.G.O.s', etc. The college has got well - equipped laboratory with modern cooking gadgets.

#### 11. Office Management and Secretarial Practice (O.M.S.P.)

Office Management and Secretarial Practice is a practical-based and job-oriented commercial course for learning better management of modern office through improved knowledge of front office and back office. Communication and office management, theoretical and practical knowledge of stenography and wide use of computer applications and internet are the part of the curriculum, as they are the basic need of today's changing methods of working in modern offices. This course will make students proficient in terms of managing general office activities. Preference would be given to students who had O.M.S.P. subject at 10+2 level. Students with basic knowledge of computers would be preferred.

#### 12. Political Science

Political Science covers many aspects. It has wide opportunities in the field of Government agencies and N.G.O.s'. It is also an integral part of various competitive and job-seeking examinations. Political Science as a Discipline paper B.A.(Programme) would be offered to those students who have studied Political Science up to class 12th and got 55% marks.

#### 13. **Psychology**

Psychology is a discipline that can provide a better understanding of other's behaviour as well encourage self-understanding. It is recognized as the scientific study of mind,

behaviour and higher mental processes. The B.A.(Programme) course teaches you the fundamentals of psychology, social, abnormal, statistics, research methodology, experimentation and psychological testing. The CBCS syllabus has a strong practical component. Students are imparted skills such as conducting experiments, administering tests, making observations, interviewing, case analyses and developing intervention programmes.

Psychology is open to students from all backgrounds, although having studied the subject in school gives you an edge. Science students are able to do better due to the strong scientific bent of the subject. Psychology needs sensitive, empathetic individuals who can also think outside the box. It is a lucrative subject because work is aplenty in a variety of settings like hospitals, counselling centres, government organizations, N.G.O.s and Research organizations. Psychology as a subject that meets not just market demands but also societal needs.

#### 14. Sanskrit

Department of Sanskrit has been working since the very beginning of the college. The subject is being taught not only as a language or main subject but as a powerful medium of personality development too. The students are being familiarized with the rich culture of India, the spiritual knowledge, related life style and so many other things like stress management through the thoughts of Bhagwadgita and Upanishads etc. Sanskrit is being taught as Discipline, language, MIL, qualifying Sanskrit, Skill-Enhancement etc.

The department motivates young tender minds to assimilate the principles of high thought, full life and sound health. We also consider how the classical texts, in a logical and scientific manner may contribute to societal betterment. The concept of ideal living, based on Vedic teachings and overcoming life-style disorders and new health issues are also discussed. The study of the subject may also help in understanding original classics and allied literature (medical and environmental sciences). Thus, the study of Sanskrit provides deep enrichment on emotional, spiritual and intellectual levels.

#### 15. Sociology

One of the initial departments of Aditi Mahavidyalaya, Sociology is taught at the B. A. (Programme) level. A very popular subject for the undergraduates, it gives them a grounding in basic sociological concepts and principles, sociology of India, theories and methods. Crucial in understanding contemporary social realities, the discipline of Sociology trains young minds for careers in teaching, journalism and research.

वर्तमान तकनीिक और सूचना-क्रांति के दौर में हिन्दी पत्रकारिता और जनसंचार का क्षेत्र रोजगार के विभिन्न विकल्पों और बेहतर सम्भावनाओं से युक्त है. उपर्युक्त पाठ्यक्रम के अंतर्गत छात्राओं को भारतीय और वैश्विक पत्रकारिकता के स्वरुप, विकास, इतिहास के सैद्धांतिक परिचय के साथ ही पत्रकारिता से सम्बंधित व्यावहारिक आयामों की जानकारी दी जाती है. प्रतिवर्ष विशेष व्याख्यानों, फिल्म-प्रदर्शन, डॉक्युमेंट्री फिल्म-निर्माण, लेखन-कला संबंधी मीडिया कार्यशालाओं व सेमिनारों का आयोजन किया जाता है. पाठ्यक्रम की आवश्यकता के अनुरूप अदिति महाविद्यालय की हिन्दी पत्रकारिता लेब में छात्राओं के प्रशिक्षण के लिए अत्याधुनिक डिजिटल कैमरों, LCD स्क्रीन, LED टी.वी., LCD प्रोजेक्टर, DVD प्लेयर, वोइस रिकॉर्डर, माइक सिस्टम, होम थिएटर आदि की व्यवस्था है. महाविद्यालय में पत्रकारिता से जुड़े विभिन्न सॉफ्टवेयर से युक्त कम्प्यूटर-लेब की भी सुविधा है. साथ ही महाविद्यालय के पुस्तकालय में पत्रकारिता से सम्बंधित महत्त्वपूर्ण पुस्तकों का संकलन है.

## B. A. (Hons.) - GEOGRAPHY

Geography is a unique discipline which studies the most intricate relationship between human and environment from both physical and social perspective. Geography studies the spatial distribution of any phenomenon on the earth's surface and its change spatially and temporally. Therefore the learning of this subject helps us in providing solutions to various environmental and societal problems.

The B.A.(Hons.) in Geography was introduced in Aditi Mahavidyalaya during the session 2007-08. The course aims to enhancing the learning experience to the students by providing them the real world information and a practical and sound understanding of the various geographical phenomena occurring every now and then. Apart from ample openings in academics, geography opens up an arena of opportunities to students who look for other options after their degree course in business, administration, law and planning etc. The course would also prepare them to pursue advanced courses in Geography and related discipline or branch of two other related fields.

The faculties with specialization in different fields of Geography teach the syllabus of through lectures, tutorials, field studies, seminars and workshops etc. The department is proud of having produced young geographers as P.G. students in nearby universities, school teachers, G.I.S. technicians and government officials.

### Eligibility criteria: As per university rules

- 1. An aggregate of 45% marks in the qualifying examination.
- 2. The merit shall be determined on the basis of one language and three best elective subjects.

**Note:** Preference would be given to the applicant who has studied Geography in 12th class.

#### **B. A. (Hons.)- SOCIAL WORK**

Social Work is a professional discipline that attempts to deal with socio-psychological and emotional issue of an individual, groups and community at large for the better functioning of our society. It helps individuals to realize their potential and become useful member of society.

Social Work deals with various social issues and problems. Youth who have genuine concern for the welfare of the society should opt for this course. Social Work equips the student with relevant skills to work under challenging situations and transmits the knowledge required for social reconstruction and regenerations.

**Vision**: Promoting an egalitarian and just society that enables students to realize the value of strengthening interpersonal relationships and social justice through advanced curriculum and research.

**Mission**: To ensure that students have the knowledge, skills, techniques and attitude necessary for taking up the responsibilities both at the grass-root and junior level engagement of social welfare and developmental services. The objectives of the course are to:

- 1. Impart education and training in professional social work in order to develop qualified personnel in social welfare and development sector.
- 2. Develop knowledge, skills, attitude and values appropriate to the profession of social Work.
- 3. Develop understanding of social needs and problems at individual, family, group and community levels respectively.

4. Learn the application of professional social work.

The course aims at providing interdisciplinary collaboration for better understanding of human needs, problems, services and issues of development. It promotes integration of theory and practice in the fields of social work. The students are provided direct exposure in the field in addition to theory classes. The students will be required to attend four days of theory classes and two days of field work in a week. Medium of instruction is both Hindi and English.

Field work is an integral part of social work curriculum. Students are placed in various settings such as schools, hospitals, de-addiction centres, N.G.O.s', community and industry etc., where they are exposed to the field realities. Once the fieldwork placement is done, no changes will be encouraged.

Apart from field work, the students are taken on a study tour/rural camp to N.G.O.s' and Development Organizations within and outside Delhi. Orientation is an integral part of Social Work curriculum. Attendance in Orientation Programme is compulsory after which admission shall close.

The department runs 'EKTA' a society which actively participates in the Departmental functions. The objective is to foster personality development of students through organizational and planning skills, cultural activities, etc. The society provides a platform for the social work students to participate and contribute in different activities like N.G.O. meet, Diwali Mela, Effulgence, etc. The department organizes various workshops, interactive session, career guidance session, exposure visits to different organizations and so on.

This Six Semester course will enable the students to get practical training in the field of social work. Later on they can engage themselves as professional social workers. In addition, students would have job opportunities in various organizations working for welfare of the children, women, youth, scheduled castes and tribes, differently abled, etc., and can further go for higher studies in social work.

#### **Eligibility**

The eligibility criteria are as follows:

- a) Any person with minimum 45% marks in the aggregate of best four subjects including at least one language in XII standard examination or its equivalent examination recognized by University of Delhi in any discipline shall be eligible to apply for this course.
- b) Candidates belonging to S.C./S.T. categories shall be allowed 5% relaxation in the eligibility requirement.

Admission procedure will take place as per Delhi University decision.

#### **COMMERCE**

The course brings together all relevant business disciplines and prepares graduates for realities of job market. Studies in accounting, finance, marketing, management, commercial laws and economics are combined with business communication, politics, ethics, introduction to business mathematics and computers. Recognizing the spectacular growth in electronic commerce, specific courses in e-commerce has been included in the curriculum. The modern methods of

analysis and data presentation involving computer technology are an integral part of the course content. Specifically, with the introduction of information technology (I.T.) model of examination in commerce, basic I.T. inputs have included in many of the compulsory papers like accountancy, statistics, income tax, investment management etc. Our commerce graduates are supervisory managers in different functional areas of business like sales, marketing, accounting and finance. The course provides a solid foundation to pursue higher professional courses such as chartered accountancy; cost accountancy, company secretary ship and M.B.A. etc. Eminent speakers from different organizations are invited for discussion on contemporary business-related issues. Every year department organizes 'Commerce Fest' which showcases the students' talent, their organizational and leadership skills.

#### B.Com. (Hons.)

The choice based credit system (CBCS) based syllabus for B.Com.(Hons.) consisting of 26 papers provides an opportunity for the students to choose papers from the prescribed courses comprising core, elective/minor skill based courses.

#### **Eligibility**

- 1. Candidates should have obtained at least 45% in the qualifying examination.
- 2. The candidates must have studied and passed Mathematics/ Business Mathematics at the qualifying exam for admission to Honors in Commerce.
- 3. As per the University of Delhi Information Bulletin 2017- 18, selection shall be based on inclusion of :

One language from Part 1 of List C1 + Three best subjects as per Part 2 of List C1.

OR

One language from Part 1 of List C1+ any combination of subjects out of Part 2 of List C1, List C2 or any other subject (not listed either in List C1 or List C2). In such a case, the deduction of marks from aggregate percentage of 'Best Four' shall be as follows:

- i. For every subject included from List C2, a deduction of one percent in aggregate percentage of 'Best Four';
- ii. For every other subject (not listed either in List C1 or List C2), a deduction of 2.5% per subject in aggregate percentage of 'Best Four'.

#### Note:

All subjects to be included in the calculation of 'Best Four' must have at least 70% theory component of examination. In case the subject to be considered does not have at least 70% theory component, then the marks obtained in theory and practical shall be converted to 70% and 30% respectively, on pro rata basis. The marks so arrived at will then be considered for calculation of 'Best Four'.

#### B.Com.

The choice based credit system (CBCS) based syllabus for B.Com. consists of 24 papers. The course provides an insight into extensive range of subjects such as Accounting, Management, Business Laws, Corporate tax, Cyber-Crimes and Cyber Laws etc.

#### **Eligibility**

- 1. Candidates should have obtained at least 40% in the qualifying examination.
- 2. As per the University of Delhi Information Bulletin 2017- 18, selection shall be based on inclusion of:

One language from Part 1 of List C1 + Three best subjects as per Part 2 of List C1.

OR

One language from Part 1 of List C1+ any combination of subjects out of Part 2 of List C1, List C2 or any other subject (not listed either in List C1 or List C2). In such a case, the deduction of marks from aggregate percentage of 'Best Four' shall be as follows:

- i. For every subject included from List C2, a deduction of one percent in aggregate percentage of 'Best Four';
- ii. For every other subject (not listed either in List C1 or List C2), a deduction of 2.5% per subject in aggregate percentage of 'Best Four'.

#### Note:

All subjects to be included in the calculation of 'Best Four' must have at least 70% theory component of examination. In case the subject to be considered does not have at least 70% theory component, then the marks obtained in theory and practical shall be converted to 70% and 30% respectively, on pro rata basis. The marks so arrived at will then be considered for calculation of 'Best Four'.

# **B.El.Ed.** (Bachelor of Elementary Education)

Bachelor of Elementary Education programme is a four-year integrated professional degree programme of teacher education offered after the senior secondary stage. This programme is an attempt towards fulfilling the need for professionally qualified elementary school teachers. It is designed to integrate the study of subject knowledge, human development with pedagogy and communication skills. It offers compulsory as well as optional theory courses, compulsory practicum courses and a comprehensive school internship experience. Students are expected to cover 19 theory courses and 7 practicum courses during the four year programme of study. Total weightage of the theory course over four years is 1250 marks and 950 marks for the practicum (total 2200 marks). These courses are designed in such a manner that they offer an opportunity to the students to study in detail the process of child development and learning, concepts and perspectives in education, processes and techniques of school organization and management,

various issues related to elementary education and development of skills to relate and communicate with children.

In 1995, our college started B.El.Ed. course with thirty five students and became the second college in the University of Delhi to offer this course. Today, we have alumni of over 600 graduates. A separate wing in the college building is exclusively dedicated to the department of B.El.Ed for the smooth conduction of the practicum, workshops and other course related activities. Department has a curriculum laboratory in which a library, computer (equipped with Internet facility) and Audio - Visual facilities are available for students and teachers. In addition to the basic reference materials, curricular resources and books including children's literature and school textbooks and audio - visual materials are also available in the library. Department has its own laboratories of Biology and Chemistry, along with a laboratory of the cooperative Department of Geography, equipped with modern equipments.

The Department of Education organizes various workshops – Theatre, Craft, Self Development and Story-telling (*Qissa-Goi*) workshops. Students also visit places of innovation teaching and learning practices. Other than these compulsory workshops, students also participate in various other activities such as heritage walk to the area of Chandni Chowk, visit to National Museum, Science Centre, workshops TERI Earth Leadership Programme, Youth Development Programme by Social work Department and 'Utsav'(college festival), which is very popular among girls. Students are encouraged to participate in extracurricular activities in other colleges and in the University.

A collection of activities and experiences of the students of the Department is brought out annually as Newsletter 'AAROHI'. The e- version of 'AAROHI' for the sessions 2014-15 and 2015-16are available at college website <a href="http://www.amv94.org">http://www.amv94.org</a>. The last two numbers are e-version and are available at college website <a href="http://www.amv94.org">http://www.amv94.org</a>. B.El.Ed Department's Alumni Meet 'MILAAP', is also the first alumni meet of the college which was organized in Jan 2013. In past years, our graduates are meaningfully contributing to many government and private schools, teacher education institutions / colleges and Non government organizations like Vidya Bhavan Society and Bodh Shiksha Samiti. Some students and faculty of the department have also been part of Innovation projects of the University of Delhi.

University of Delhi commemorated a scholarship in the memory of our student Vaishali Tomar to the toppers from the B.El.Ed. first, second and third years for the college fee and book grant. It is approximately Rs 10,000/ per annum.

# **College Infrastructure & Facilities**

#### **Library and Reading Room**

Our college library has a collection of about 20,000 books comprising of about 2000 reference books. The library remains open throughout the year from 9a.m. to 5 p.m. except on Sundays and official holidays. There are separate sections for newspapers, magazines, periodicals and books for general reading. The reference section stacks encyclopaedia, dictionaries and thesaurus. There is a comfortable seating arrangement in reading room which provides a calm environment for study.

#### **Biology Laboratory**

The Biology Laboratory of the college is well-equipped with all modern scientific apparatus to aid and support the curriculum of Biology (optional paper) in B.El.Ed. The equipments are made available to the students to facilitate practical knowledge of the course.

#### **Chemistry Laboratory**

It is spacious, well-ventilated and equipped with modern equipments and apparatus like Ph. meter and conductometer, etc. which facilitate students in conducting experiments and research.

#### **Curriculum and Resource Centre**

B.El.Ed. has a curriculum laboratory and Resource Centre. It has an exclusive library and reading space for B.El.Ed. Students and faculty members. It has more than two thousand books, magazines, and other reading material for various theory papers and practicum of the B.El.Ed. Course. It also has various teaching learning material in the form of teaching aids, charts, activities, models, flash cards, science and mathematics kit etc. Other than books, students have access to different encyclopaedias, glossaries and dictionaries. These books and material can be issued to students. The laboratory is also equipped with audio-visual aids like O.H.P., Television, Music System and Computer with internet facility.

#### **Collage Hall**

College has a spacious hall where curricular, co- curricular and cultural activities are conducted throughout the year. Seminars, workshops, orientation programmes and trainings are organized here. The college hall is constantly engaged in various activities organized by the departments.

#### Canteen

The canteen is a popular stop-over for students and staff to grab a bite between classes. It provides an informal space, where students gather informally. It is run under the supervision of the college canteen committee, provides refreshment and hygienic eatables at reasonable prices.

#### **Computer Centre**

College has computer labs. The software three and hardware constantly latest technology. There are upgraded to keep abreast with 160 computers and latest special purpose software packages to meet the requirements of the curriculum. Though the students from any discipline may use the lab., the students of B. Com. (Hons.) and B. Com. need to study computer papers as their main papers, the college provides them with the latest special purpose software packages.

#### **Counselling Unit**

Counselling Unit opens for three days a week. An experienced professional counsellor who is associated with many governmental and non-governmental organizations is appointed for counselling. A separate cabin is made to maintain the privacy and confidentiality. Feedback is taken from the counsellor intermittently. Students receive counselling sessions as per their needs.

#### Family and Child Welfare Laboratory

The laboratory is equipped with audio-visual aids to support curriculum delivery. Different psychological tests as per the curriculum are also available.

#### **Food Technology Laboratory**

This laboratory is equipped with state-of-the-art facilities to produce bakery items like bread, buns, cakes, pastries, biscuits etc. and preserved food items like jams, jellies, pickles, preserves etc. The laboratory is well-equipped with modern gadgets and equipments for baking, preservation and quality analysis.

#### **Geography Laboratory**

A practical knowledge of the subject, through the use of various laboratory equipments such as computers, maps, charts, diagrams, models, barometers, thermometers, compasses etc. is imparted to the students here.

#### **Global fund Conference room**

College has a conference room which is equipped with all the modern equipments and facilities like overhead projector, audio visual system, etc.

#### **Hindi Journalism Laboratory**

For the students of Hindi Patrakarita Evam Jansanchar, the College maintains a repository of audio-visual equipments such as overhead projectors, slide projectors, television, computers, web camera etc. to support curriculum delivery. Students are encouraged to use them in their presentations.

#### **Music Room**

The Music Room is a is a great help in enabling the students to acquire the divine art of music. The Music Room is a space to perform various curricular and co-curricular activities, train themselves and participate in various competitions apart from regular rehearsals. It houses instruments like the tanpura, harmonium, tabla, music system and guitar etc.

#### **Nutrition and Health Education Laboratory**

The laboratory has facilities of modern cooking gadgets and equipments such as refrigerators, food processors, oven, non-stick cookware, idli cooker etc. Students are provided with ingredients as well as utensils so that they can work efficiently in a hygienic environment. Students are encouraged to use energy-saving techniques and gadgets that help to preserve nutritional content of food.

#### **Psychology Laboratory**

The college has a well-equipped Psychology Laboratory. It stocks latest psychological tests and apparatuses. The equipment is made available to the students to facilitate the practical work of the discipline.

#### **Social Work Unit Room**

The Social Work unit is a multipurpose room, where the social work students, teaching staff and non-teaching staff get-together for various activities like individual conferences, Ekta Associations meetings, faculty interaction with experts etc. The unit also has a small collection of social-work related books for reference work. This also serves as reading room for Social Work students.

#### **Sports Room**

The college arranges for various items required for games such as Kho- Kho, Kabaddi, Volleyball, Judo, Athletics etc in sports zone. It also has a mini gymnasium. The Department of Physical Education and sports sciences functions with a view to build a balance between mind and body. The Department provides opportunities and exposure for personality development of sports girls.

#### **Photocopy**

The college allows a private agency to run a photocopy shop in its premises. The services are efficient, economical and student-friendly.

# **SOCIETIES AND CELLS**

#### Alumni committee

The Alumni Committee of Aditi Mahavidyalaya intends to connect with each alumnus of our college and fosters a spirit of loyalty. It also aims to collect data about their profiles, achievements, academic and professional growth. On 6<sup>th</sup> May, 2017 our college celebrated the first Alumni Meet. The programme was full of cultural events and interactions between proud Aditians and the teachers. More than a hundred alumni participated and registered themselves for the event. The committee aims to hold a Meet regularly, so that the ties between alumni and parent organization are strengthened.

#### **Debating Society**

It aims to develop the skills of creative and logical arguments and public speaking among students. It provides them a platform to express and exchange ideas on pertinent issues. The Society helps students to represent college in various debate competitions. Debates are organized in Hindi and English at intra and inter-college levels.

#### **Dramatic Society**

The role of the Dramatic Society is to generate awareness among the students through entertainment and drama thereby educating them about social and gender related issues. The goal is to make the students realize, internalize and respond to the core problems of the society. The Dramatic Society provides the students with an insight to cope with the day to day challenges. Dramatic Society organizes a one-month long theatre workshop in collaboration with National School of Drama for the students who are interested in dramatics and theatre. During the workshops students prepare a full-length play which is presented in the college and Mandi House. The college has showcased nine plays till date which were highly appreciated by the audience. Last year the team performed the play titled 'Jhansi Ki Rani' in the direction of renowned theatre director Sh. Surendra Sharma.

#### **Environment Committee**

The Environment Committee of the college was constituted to expand awareness among all in the college regarding issues related to the environment. The most important objective is to sensitize the students about the role of clean and green environment.

#### **Equal Opportunity Cell**

Aditi Mahavidyalaya is strongly committed to the principle of providing equal opportunities to the differently abled. In order to translate its vision to reality, Equal Opportunity Cell *Samvedana* has been set up. Ramps and tactile surfaces have been built to provide barrier free access to the differently-abled staff, students and visitors. *Samvedana* organises sensitization programmes.

#### Film Society

Film Society of college holds screening of important films of Hindi and world cinema. In addition, the society introduces technique of film and documentary making along with film appreciation methods. Society organises workshop and seminars related to cinema. Last year 'Off-beat cinema' theme seminar was held. The films were shot and recorded by our own students. The purpose of the society is to create awareness about the role of cinema in development of society and its prominent issues and concerns.

#### **Gandhi Study Circle**

This provides a forum for discussion, lectures and activities on the life, work and philosophy of Mahatma Gandhi. The aim is to create an understanding of Gandhian thoughts of truth and non-violence and their perpetual relevance.

#### **Innovations in Teaching Practices Committee**

The college runs the Innovations in Teaching Practices Cell where an attempt is made to use more of technology in teaching – learning process. Automation, optimal use of internet and harvesting of authentic and productive websites, programmes and/ tools etc. are explored. The cell also thinks about interactive teaching, well-researched pedagogies and enhanced learning whether gadgets or technologies are used sparingly or extensively.

#### **Music Society**

The Society helps to identify and nurture skills among students in various forms of dance and music and conducts inter-college and intra-college competitions. Eminent personalities are also invited for live performances.

#### **National Cadet Corps (N.C.C.)**

National cadet corps (N.C.C.) has been introduced in the college with the main objective of inculcating a sense of 'Unity and Discipline' among students to make them better citizens. N.C.C. helps cadets to develop responsibility and integrity to develop into better citizens.

#### **National Service Scheme (N.S.S.)**

College has an active N.S.S. unit. The overall objective of N.S.S. is to develop a sense of social commitment among the students and sensitize them to various social issues. Members of N.S.S. unit are involved in awareness programmes about A.I.D.S., drug abuse, child rights and primary education among slum dwellers. N.S.S. unit regularly organizes blood donation camps in the college.

#### **Placement Cell**

The placement cell aims at providing employment opportunities to students while in college, and arranges for internship programmes so that they can gain exposure to practical work environment. The Cell endeavors to increase employment potential of students by instilling confidence and developing leadership qualities in them. The cell reaches out to students of all departments in the college and informs them of job and internship opportunities offered by the C.P.C. (D.U.) and other institutions.

# Rashtriya Ucchatar Shiksha Abhiyaan (R.U.S.A.)

The college is in the process of receiving financial assistance under Rashtriya Ucchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (R.U.S.A.). The scheme will ensure the improvement of overall quality of faculty and infrastructure and facilitate research and innovation in the college. The college campus may soon have air-cooled lecture theatres with modern audio and video presentation system. Each class room is likely to be equipped with audio-visual aids and internet connectivity. The Labs may have state-of-the-art equipments that may help students to truly harness their creativity without having to worry about technical difficulties. R.U.S.A. grant might enable the college to launch value added courses for the students of different streams to improve employability of the students.

#### **Skill Development Cell**

The Skill Development Cell has been established in college to develop competence and skills among students, which would increase their employment potential. Since its inception, the cell has been instrumental in bridging the gap between education and employment of girls (especially in suburban Delhi) where even sending them to college is a distant dream for many. It aids in training students for commercial and industrial set up.

# **Sports Committee**

Sports Committee works to support the functioning of the Department of Physical Education. It functions in collaboration with the Sports Department and plays an important role in organization and conduction of various sports events especially annual sports day along with other sports events such as self- defence training programmes, cross country race, adventure sports, health-related seminars and workshops. Committee also plays a major role in taking approvals concerning important purchases of the department and taking grants from government for conduction of events and workshops.

## **Students Aid & Fee-Concession**

Students are also given financial aid and fee concession on the basis of need-cum-merit basis. Students are required to submit duly filled forms (obtainable from the college office) supported by the required documents by the specified dates in the college office. Eligible S.C./S.T./O.B.C./P.W.D. students etc. students should submit their scholarship form for the academic year by February for processing scholarship to S.C./S.T./O.B.C./P.W.D. students each year (as per U.G.C. guidelines).

#### **Swachh Bharat Abhiyan**

In pursuit of 'Swachh Bharat Abhiyan', Aditi Mahavidyalaya had launched a special cleanliness drive and formally constituted a committee to monitor and coordinate cleanliness activities in the college. It generates mass awareness on cleanliness and hygiene among students and staff members by holding regular sensitization programmes so as to motivate and associate them with the campaign in a proactive manner. Rallies on themes connected with 'Swachh Bharat Abhiyan' are conducted in and around the college campus.

#### Unnat Bharat Abhiyaan (U.B.A.) Cell Report

U.B.A. is a central government funded programme and is based on Gandhian concept of 'Gram Swaraj' ie making villages self-sufficient in their basic needs like food, livelihood, health care, education etc.

U.B.A. Cell of Aditi Mahavidyalaya has adopted Bawana and its adjacent villages to make them self-reliant and hence 'Adarsh Grams'. The college has initiated baseline survey for the demographic profiling of Bawana and adjacent villages. The N.S.S. team of the college is an integral part of this cell. The U.B.A. Cell of the college has tried to take at least one member from each department so that each department can contribute towards the all-round development of the villages in their own unique way. At present the Cell is working on its funding part. Later, each department will be requested to make action plans for sustainable development of 'Bawana' village in particular and other villages in general. Certain social issues have also been identified by the Cell on which it intends to work in coming months. Exploration and development of necessary linkages with other stakeholders, programmes and units/N.G.O.s in action are also under process. The college has also initiated the process of opening up of 'Entrepreneur Cell' to help villagers and college students in attaining self-sufficiency and self- reliance. In this way, it will also help in developing linkages of the college with the community. The college would no longer be considered as an isolated unit concerned only with academics but a unit which is

dedicated to unfold the tremendous hidden potential of people of Bawana and adjacent villages and to transform them into model villages.

# **Women Development Cell (W.D.C.)**

'U.R.J.A.', the college W.D.C., is a forum to address various women-related issues and to create an understanding of gender-equality. The cell conducts various activities such as self-defence workshops, experts' panel discussions, seminars and presentations on relevant issues. It also provides counselling services to students to deal with their personal problems.

## **Departmental Societies**

Departmental societies organize various competitions, quizzes, seminars and debates on general issues related to their subjects. The idea is to expose students to subject- specific contemporary issues. The students of the respective departments are the members of these departmental societies.

# Maintenance of discipline among Students of the University:

#### Ordinance XV-B

- 1. All powers relating to discipline and disciplinary action are vested in the Vice Chancellor.
- 2. The Vice-Chancellor may delegate all or such powers as he / she deems proper to the Proctor and to such other persons as he/she may specify in this behalf.
- 3. Without prejudice to the generality of power to enforce discipline under the Ordinance the following shall amount to acts of gross indiscipline:
- a. Physical assault, or threat to use physical force, against any member of the teaching and non-teaching staff of any Institution / Department and against any student within the University of Delhi.
- b. Carrying of, use of or threat to use of any weapons.
- c. Any violation of the provisions of the Civil Rights Protection Act, 1976.
- d. Violation of the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the scheduled castes and tribes.
- e. Any practice-whether verbal or otherwise-derogatory of women.
- f. Any attempt at bribing or corruption in any manner
- g. Willful destruction of institutional property
- h. Creating ill-will or intolerance on religious or communal grounds
- i. Causing disruption in any manner of the academic functioning of the University system;
- j. Prohibition of Ragging as per Ordinance XV-C.
- 4. Without prejudice to the generality of his / her powers relating to the maintenance of discipline and taking such action in the interest of maintaining discipline as may seem to him/her appropriate, the Vice-Chancellor, may in the exercise of his / her powers aforesaid order or direct that any student or students -
- a. be expelled; or
- b. be, for a stated period rusticated; or

- c. be not for a stated period, admitted to a course or courses of study in a College, Department or Institution of the University; or d. be fined with a sum of rupees that may be specified; or
- e. be debarred from taking a University or College or Departmental Examination or Examinations for one or more years; or that the result of the student or students concerned in

the Examination or Examinations in which he /she or they have appeared be cancelled.

- 5. Institutions, Halls and teaching in the concerned Departments. They may exercise their authority through, or delegate authority to such of the teachers in their Colleges, Institutions or Departments as they may specify for these purposes.
- 6. Without prejudice to the powers of the Vice-Chancellor and the Proctor as aforesaid, detailed rules of discipline and proper conduct shall be framed. These rules may be supplemented, where necessary, by the Principals of Colleges, Heads of Halls, Deans of Faculties and Heads of Teaching Departments in this University. Each student shall be expected to provide himself / herself with a copy of these rules. At the time of admission, every student shall be required to sign a declaration that on admission he /she submits himself / herself to the disciplinary jurisdiction of the Vice-Chancellor and several authorities of the University who may be vested with the authority to exercise discipline under the Acts, the Statutes, the Ordinances and the rules that have been framed therein by the University

#### **Prohibition and Punishment for Ragging**

#### **Ordinance XV-C**

- 1. Ragging in any form is strictly prohibited, within the premises of College / Department or Institution and any part of Delhi University system as well as on public transport.
- 2. Any individual or collective act or practice of ragging constitutes gross indiscipline and shall be dealt with under this Ordinance.
- 3. Ragging for the purposes of this Ordinance, ordinarily means any act, conduct or practice by which dominant power or status of senior students is brought to bear on students freshly enrolled or students who are in any way considered junior or inferior by other students; and includes individual or collective acts or practices which
  - a. involve physical assault or threat to use of physical force.
  - b. violate the status, dignity and honour of women students.
  - c. violate the status, dignity and honour of students belonging to the scheduled caste and tribe.
  - d. expose students to ridicule and contempt and affect their self-esteem.
  - e. entail verbal abuse and aggression, indecent gestures and obscene behavior.

- 4. The Principal of a College, the Head of the Department or an Institution, the authorities of College, or University Hostel or Halls of Residence shall take immediate action on any information of the occurrence of ragging.
- 5. Notwithstanding anything in Clause (4) above, the Proctor may also suomoto enquire into any incident of ragging and make a report to the Vice-Chancellor of the identity of those who have engaged in ragging and the nature of the incident.
- 6. The Proctor may also submit an initial report establishing the identity of the perpetrators of ragging and the nature of the ragging incident.
- 7. If the Principal of a College or Head of the Department or Institution or the Proctor is satisfied that for some reason, to be recorded in writing, it is not reasonably practical to hold such an enquiry, he/ she may so advise the Vice-Chancellor accordingly.
- 8. When the Vice-Chancellor is satisfied that it is not expedient to hold such an enquiry, his / her decision shall be final.
- 9. On the receipt of a report under Clause (5) or (6) or a determination by the relevant authority under clause (7) disclosing the occurrence of ragging incidents described in Clause 3(a), (b) and (c), the Vice-Chancellor shall direct or order rustication of a student or students for a specific number of years.
- 10. The Vice-chancellor may in other cases of ragging order or direct that any student or students be expelled or be not for a stated period, admitted to a course of study in a college, departmental examination for one or more years or that the results of the student or students concerned in the examination or examinations in which they appeared be cancelled.
- 11. In case any students who have obtained degrees or diplomas of Delhi University are found guilty; under this Ordinance, appropriate action will be taken under Statute 15 for withdrawal of degrees or diploma conferred by the University.
- 12. For the purpose of this Ordinance, abetment to ragging whether by way of any act, practice or incitement of ragging will also amount to ragging.
- 13. All Institutions within the Delhi University system shall be obligated to carry out instructions / directions issued under this Ordinance, and to give aid assistance to the Vice-Chancellor to achieve the effective implementation of the Ordinance.

# The Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal) Act, 2013 (Ministry Of Law and Justice)

An Act to provide protection against sexual harassment of women at work place and for the prevention and redressal of complaints of sexual harassment and for matters connected there with incidental thereto.

WHEREAS sexual harassment results in violation of the fundamental rights of a woman to equality under articles 14 and 15 of the Constitution of India and her right to life and to live with dignity under article 21 of the Constitution and right to practice any profession or to carry on any occupation, trade or business which includes a right to a safe environment free from sexual harassment;

AND WHEREAS the protection against sexual harassment and the right to work with dignity are universally recognized human rights by international conventions and instruments such as Convention on the Elimination of all forms of discrimination against Women, which has been ratified on the 25th June, 1993 by the Government of India.

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to make provisions for giving effect to the said Convention for protection of women against sexual harassment at workplace.

## Procedure for Calculating 'Best Four' Subjects

#### Annexure-XIII (as per D.U. Guidelines)

- I. Procedure for calculation of 'Best Four' subjects percentage for Honours Programmes (For admission to Arts/ Humanities Programmes):
  - a. The merit shall be determined on the basis of one language and three best academic/elective subjects from LIST A.
  - b. Out of three, academic/elective subject chosen above, one must be the concerned subject in which the admission is sought, failing which a deduction of 2.5% will be imposed on the calculated 'Best Four' percentage.

For honours in languages refer to **point 6 of Basis of calculation of Best Four** given below.

#### Note:

- i. If an applicant doesn't include the subjects given in LIST A in 'Best Four', then a deduction of 2.5% of maximum marks will be levied for each subject for the purpose of calculating 'Best Four'
- ii. All subjects to be included in the calculation of 'Best Four'must have at least 70% theory component of exam. In case, the subject to be considered does not have 70% theory component and 30% practical component, then the marks of theory and practical only shall be converted to 70% and 30%, respectively on pro rata basis. These new marks will then be considered for calculation of 'Best Four'.

#### **Examples**

- (1) If an applicant has scored: Physics 90 (theory 50, practical 40; max. marks theory 60, practical 40), and Chemistry 91 (theory 52, practical 39; max. marks theory 60, practical
  - 40) which is not in ratio of 70: 30, then the marks can be converted on *pro rata* basis Pro rata marks in physics = 88.33; ((50/60) x 70 + (40/40) x 30) = 58.33 + 30 = 88.33

Pro rata marks in chemistry = 89.92;  $((52/60) \times 70 + (39/40) \times 30) = 60.66 + 29.25 = 89.91$ 

(2) If an applicant has scored: Physics 88 (theory 45, IA 14, practical 29; max. marks theory 56, IA 14, practical 30), Chemistry 92 (theory 48, IA 14, practical 30; max. marks theory 56, IA 14, practical 30), English (90) and Biology 95 (theory 51, IA 14, practical 30; max. marks theory 56, IA 14, practical 30). Mathematics 92. The marks in Physics, Chemistry and Biology have less than 70% theory component and therefore have to be converted to 70:30 ratio on pro rata basis.

For Physics, it is 
$$56.25 + 29 = 85.25$$
;  $((45/56) \times 70 + 29) = 56.25 + 29 = 85.25$   
For Chemistry, it is  $60 + 30 = 90$ ;  $((48/56) \times 70 + 30 = 60 + 30 = 90)$ 

For Biology, it is 
$$63.75 + 30 = 93.75$$
;  $((51/56) \times 70 + 30 = 63.75 + 30 = 93.75)$ 

The following discipline subjects must be treated as Academic/ Elective subjects for the purpose of undergraduate admissions. All other subjects offered by different boards may be treated as non-elective.

# **Basis of calculation of Best Four**

- 1. Mass Media Studies will be treated as an academic subject for the purpose of admission to B.A. (Hons.) Journalism (Hindi/ English).
- 2. In case an applicant has studied elective and core languages, the core language subject will be treated as language, while elective language can be considered as academic/ elective subject.
- 3. Admission to B.A. (Hons.) Applied Psychology will be based on 'Best Four' percentage as in B.A. (Hons.) Psychology.

- 4. Admission to B.A. (Hons.) Social Work and B.A. (Hons.) Philosophy will be based on 'Best Four' percentage including one language and three academic/elective subjects as per the above procedure.
- 5. The applicants must have studied and passed Mathematics at the qualifying exam for admission to B.A. (Honours) in Economics.
- 6. (a) For admission to Honours in any language programme, advantage of 2% in the 'Best Four' percentage will be given to those applicants who have studied that particular elective language.
  - (b) In case, an applicant has not studied a language at qualifying exam and is seeking admission to Honours in that language (except for Honours in English and Hindi, refer (c)), deduction of 5% will be imposed on 'Best Four' percentage.
  - (c) For admission to Honours in English and Hindi, the applicant must have studied and passed the respective language in the qualifying exam and should include respective language for calculation of 'Best Four' percentage.
- 7. University may define any other relevant subjects as an academic/ elective for a particular Honours programme.

#### II. Procedure for calculation of 'Best Four' subjects percentage for B. Com.

#### (Honours)/B.Com.:

One Language from Part 1 of List C1 + three best subjects out of Part 2 of List C1.

#### OR

One Language from Part 1 of List C1 + any combination of subjects out of Part 2 of List C1, List C2 or any other subject (not listed either in List C1 or List C2). In such a case, the deduction of marks from aggregate percentage of 'Best Four' shall be as follows:

- i. For every subject included from List C2, a deduction of one percent in aggregate percentage of 'Best Four';
- ii. For every other subject (not listed either in List C1 or List C2), a deduction of 2.5% per subject in aggregate percentage of 'Best Four'.

## Note:

- 1. All subjects to be included in the calculation of 'Best Four' must have at least 70% theory component of examination. In case the subject to be considered does not have at least 70% theory component, then the marks obtained in theory and practical shall be converted to 70% and 30% respectively, on pro rata basis. The marks so arrived at will then be considered for calculation of 'Best Four'.
- 2. The applicant must have studied and passed Mathematics/Business Mathematics at the qualifying examination for admission to B. Com. (Hons.).
- 3. The computation of 'best four' subjects in the above framework should lead to an effective and unique 'best four' which would be higher than any other combination of 'best four' subjects.

- b. Any three elective subjects can be chosen. A deduction of upto 5% on 'Best Four' percentage may be imposed if there is a change of stream, which means either from Commerce stream to Arts/Humanities/Social Sciences or from Science stream to Arts/Humanities/Social Sciences...

<sup>\*</sup>Marks in physics/chemistry/biology papers should be in ratio of 70: 30 (theory: practical), otherwise, marks calculated on *pro rata* basis will be considered.

- c. One non-listed (LIST A of 0) subject can be included in calculation of 'Best Four' without any deduction.
- d. For admission to B.A. (Vocational) only, related vocational subjects may be treated at par with academic/elective subjects and upto two vocational subjects which are in relationship with the programme of study may be included for the calculation of 'Best Four'.
- e. If an applicant opts for Modern Indian Language (MIL) (Except Hindi) as a subject, an advantage of up to 10% may be given in 'Best Four' in those colleges where MIL is offered as a subject.

#### Note:

i. The college will have to notify the actual deduction upto 5% for change of stream beforehand by uploading on their website and intimating the same to the University.

- ii. If more than one non-listed subject is included for calculation of 'Best Four', a deduction of 2.5% each in 'Best Four' may be levied in addition to deduction due to change of stream, if any.
- iii. All subjects to be included in the calculation of 'Best Four' must have at least 70% theory component of exam. In case, the subject to be considered does not have 70% theory component and 30% practical component, then the marks of theory and practical only shall be converted to 70% and 30%, respectively on pro rata basis. These new marks will then be considered for calculation of 'Best Four' in addition to Note (i).

#### Examples for calculation of 'Best Four' Percentage are given below.

#### Example 13:

If an applicant has scored in Accountancy (90), Business Studies (92), English Core (88) and Economics (94). Total marks are 90+92+88+94=364. The Percentage is 91%.

# **Admission to Science Programmes**

The Basis of Selection for Mathematical Sciences/Science/Home Science programmes is listed in <u>Section 5.3</u>. All the subjects to be included for Basis of Selection (PCM/PCB/PCMB) must have at least 70% theory component of examination. In case, the subject to be considered does not have 70% theory component and 30% practical component, then the marks of theory and practical only must be converted to 70% and 30%, respectively on pro rata basis. These new marks will then be considered for calculation of PCM/PCB etc.

# Example 17:

If an applicant has scored: Physics 90 (theory 50, practical 40; max. marks theory 60, practical 40), Chemistry 91(theory 52, practical 39; max. marks theory 60, practical 40), English (90) and Mathematics (95), Physical Education (92). Physics and Chemistry have 60% theory component and 40% practical marks.

Pro rata marks in physics = 88.33% Pro rata marks in chemistry = 89.92%

Therefore, Total marks in PCM are: 88.33+89.92+95=273.25=91.08% and PCME are: 88.3+89.92+95+90=363.25=90.81%.

# Example 18:

If an applicant has scored: Physics 88 (theory 45, IA 14, practical 29; max. marks theory 56, IA 14, practical 30), Chemistry 92 (theory 48, IA 14, practical 30; max. marks theory 56, IA 14, practical 30), English (90) and Biology 95 (theory 51, IA 14, practical 30; max. marks theory 56, IA 14, practical 30). Mathematics 92. Physics, Chemistry and Biology have less than 70% theory component and must be converted to 70:30.

For Physics, it is 56.25+29 = 85.25; For chemistry, it is 60+30=90; For biology, it is 63.75+30=93.75. The PCB is 89.77%; PCM is 89.19%
