Introduction

Women's view on decision-making is another relevant aspect to understand their status and power in the family system. Women's say in matters related to maternal healthcare is crucial for service utilization. Dixon (1978) has defined women's decision making as, "the degree of women's access to, and control over, material resources (including food, income, land & other forms of wealth) and to social resource (including knowledge, power and prestige) within the family in the community, and in the society at large". Women's ability to perform certain tasks on their own-personal autonomy include purchase (items of daily use, cloths for children & personal goods) and take aside child to doctors on their own (Visaria, 1996). In rural areas of Jaipur, decision-making regarding family size in 43.33 percent of the decision was taken by husband, 30 percent by mother-in-law, 20 percent by husband and wife and 6.67 percent by women alone (Kaul, 1996).

Chapter-17 Women's Perception on Participation of Husbands in Maternal Health Care Services

Maternal health is related to the Right to Health of women. Access to adequate facilities during pregnancy and child birth is an important component. Quality health care in these stages is the right health (MHCL-5), to improve health of women and reduce the maternal mortality in 100 days per 100,000 live births by 2015 is being targeted. However, the current situation of maternal health in the country is alarming and deteriorating. The Maternal Mortality Ratio (MMR) in 152 deaths per one lakh live births in India (Sample Registration System, 2007-09). Every year, 65,000 women die due to these pregnancy related complications or dying during the child birth, which is more than in other countries (The Times of India, 2012). The World Health Organization defines maternal health as when a woman is healthy and having experience, she has more women in an advanced state of health, it is healthy and safe birth. The WHO defines 'pregnancy health in physical, mental and social well-being of women commencing before conception, during pregnancy, delivery, postnatal and after child birth period'.

Women's Participation in Maternal Health Care

Women in patriarchal social structure like India, are often considered individuals. Their own well-being dimensions of their gender based vulnerability - their personal and societal health, women have been encouraged to engage education and access other developmental services. They enjoy more freedom mobility within the four walls of the household. Indian (1981) guidelines, that age and sex have been two guiding principles of defining family relationship, which have been applied by the Government and other gender groups and control their concepts. The application of such system are more visible today in many families. Whether or not have been considered to be the joint decision-making in matters related to economic and child care. Women, more or less, are more positive on decisions related to reproductive, child care, prenatal care and child care (Kishor, 1997; Aggarwal, 1997 & Kishor, 1982). So these family decisions are powerful in the contemporary world.
